#### Why BP Failed to Learn the Lessons from Elsewhere: The Texas City Refinery Fire

Professor Andrew Hopkins - Australian National University

Andrew Hopkins, former Professor of Sociology at the Australian National University in Canberra, is a world renowned authority on the causes of major industrial accidents. His recent books have focused on their organisational and cultural causes. He was an expert witness at the Royal Commission into the causes of the fire at Esso's gas plant at Longford in Victoria in 1998. In 2001 he was the expert member of the Board of Inquiry into the exposure of Air Force maintenance workers to toxic chemicals. He has been involved in various government OHS reviews and has done consultancy work for major companies in the resources sector. His book on that accident is Failure to Learn: the BP Texas City Refinery Disaster. Andrew Hopkins is the recipient of the EPSC Process Safety Award for 2008 for his extraordinary contribution to process safety within Europe.

He was also part of the team that developed the beyond best practice sealed shipment process for lead carbonate concentrate. He has developed, managed and implemented the successful approval with the State Government to remove the 9,000 t of stockpiled lead carbonate concentrate from the Port of Esperance and the export of this hazardous material through the Port of Fremantle.
